Begins Monday, September 10



LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

I am learning that there is something really different about being part of a "downtown" church—a church nestled in among businesses and restaurants, with lots of foot traffic and limited parking. Most of my personal and all of my professional church life has been spent in "neighborhood" churches—churches tucked among residential homes. In downtown churches, our neighbors are shop owners and servers, bartenders and cashiers. We meet our neighbors by sticking our heads in their shops or pulling up a stool to eat or grab a drink. In a neighborhood church our neighbors are homeowners and families. We meet our neighbors while walking our dogs or mowing our lawns. In downtown churches, it is good to join the Chamber of Commerce. In neighborhood churches, it is good to host the book club. Royal Oak First is a downtown church in the heart of a thriving downtown.

That is never more true than next weekend, when nearly a half million people will descend into downtown Royal Oak for the annual Arts, Beats, and Eats Festival. Then you can go and experience the fun of the festival.
