### Worship Series: It's Real



# STEWARDSHIP QUESTIONS

This month, you will hear a lot about the ways that your generosity helps make Christ's love real. You may have some questions about how we put your generosity to use to do that. We have compiled some of the most frequently asked questions to help.

- 1. What is the 2019 operating budget?
  - a. The projected budget is \$775,000, a 6% increase over the 2018 budget.
- 2. How is the budget determined?
  - a. Many factors are considered in the budget process including looking at the previous year's expenses and new ministries that we would like to implement to support our growing church. The 2019 income will be based on the results of the fall stewardship campaign. The expense budget will be compared to the estimated income and adjustments will be made so we go into 2019 with a balanced budget.
- 3. How many people do we employ?
  - a. We have a staff of 6 full time and 12 part time employees. In addition, we have many volunteers that provide support for our programs.
- 4. How much do we pay in salaries?
  - a. Our 2019 budget is \$429,070.
- 5. What are the annual utility costs?
  - a. Last year we spent \$50,000 on utilities. This year appears to be slightly higher. Through September, we have spent \$38,586 on utilities (\$23,453 on electricity, \$10,248 on gas and \$4885 on phones and water).
- 6. How much do we pay for routine building maintenance including lawn care and snow removal?
  - a. Last year we spent \$30,000. This year we have spent \$26,598 through September.
- 7. What is the average pledge?
  - a. Last year the average pledge was \$2,667
- 8. What is the total number of pledges?
  - a. Last year there were 230 pledges.
- 9. What is our current membership?
  - a. Our current membership is around 760. We have welcomed over 60 new members this year.
- 10. What is our average worship attendance?
  - a. Our average worship attendance has climbed from 300 to 385 this year.

# LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

#### 5, 28, 62, 65, 70 and 5

Those six winning numbers would have won \$1.6 Billion in the Mega Millions Lottery. I am going to let you in on a little secret. My wife Bridget gets very excited every time the lottery hits these record highs. She loves to dream about how we would spend the money. And here is what is interesting, she doesn't get all that excited about buying homes or cars or toys for us. No, what she gets excited about is dreaming about all the big puffy checks that she could give away to organizations doing important work.

\$1 million to the NOAH Project to feed the hungry here in our community

- \$1 million to World Medical Relief to send crucial supplies around the world
- \$1 million to Church World Service to feed the hungry around the world
- \$1 million to the Methodist Children's Home to care for boys in foster care
- \$1 million to Common Ground to help homeless teens
- \$1 million to Alternative for Girls to give young girls every chance to succeed

\$1 million to Cass Community Social Services and the Redford Brightmoor Initiative to empower the poor

\$1 million to the Southern Poverty Law Center to combat racism and hate crimes\$1 million to The United Methodist Committee on Relief to be on the front lines when natural disasters strike

\$1 Million each for cancer, diabetes, Alzheimer's, heart disease, and multiple sclerosis research

And this is just the short list.

The truth of matter is that our odds of winning the Mega Millions are vanishingly small. We're 400 more times likely to be hit by lighting. So why do so many people go out and spend two dollars on contests that they are almost certain to lose? Because, like Bridget, the moment unlocks our deepest hopes: How could I make the world better?

All this dreaming about how we'd like to make an impact made us realize something: this is why we belong to the church. This place takes our deepest hopes and dreams for a world without hunger and poverty and allows us to join with others in helping to make that happen. Even without having access to those millions of dollars, we are able to give what we can. With the generosity of others, and the grace of God, we can be a part of something bigger than ourselves and be a partner in changing the world.
