



LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

"Destiny. It belongs to the underdogs," said then St. Louis Rams football coach Dick Vermeil, played by actor Dennis Quaid, in this week's film "American Underdog." The film is a movie fairytale based on the true-life story of former NFL quarterback Kurt Warner who went from stocking shelves at the Hy-Vee grocery in Cedar Rapids, Iowa to winning the Super Bowl. It is truly an underdog story.

I love a good underdog story. Whether it is "Rocky," "The Karate Kid" or "The Shawshank Redemption," I am inspired by stories about the triumph of the human spirit. They leave me hopeful that at the end of day, good people will get their chance to shine.

What are some of your favorite underdog stories?

The truth is God is also on the side of the underdog. In fact, our faith is an underdog's faith. Whether it's David vs. Goliath, Moses vs. Pharaoh, Joseph vs. his brothers, the God of our Bible is often on the side of the smaller, weaker, and poorer among us.

In fact, the Jesus story is the ultimate underdog tale. Think about it. Jesus was born in a small, backwater village to working poor parents. He did not have any formal degrees or titles. He held no formal positions of power. He had only two dozen followers who themselves were not remarkable in any worldly sense. Jesus hung out with the underdogs of society, people who could not fight any great armies or buy any influence. Jesus died a criminal's death in a very public and humiliating manner. God raised this man from the dead. Not a political leader or war hero or great theologian or some pious preacher. No, God raised Jesus, the poor Palestine peasant preacher and said this will show the world what my power and love look like.

I remind us all of this because at one time or another, and maybe even especially right now, we can feel like the odds are against us. For all kinds of reasons, we can worry that no matter how we try - we cannot win. And in these kinds of moments, it can be easy to think God has either forgotten you or is conspiring against you. That is why truly seeing our scriptures as the story of the Underdog God on the side of their underdog people is essential.

So show up this Sunday, either online or in person, as we explore what it means to be an underdog and embrace an underdog faith.
