LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Beloved Community,

There are moments in the life of a church when it becomes important to say out loud who we are. Not because we are anxious, but because clarity matters.

And because there are a lot of people, inside and outside the church, carrying versions of Christianity that have become heavy, fearful, harsh, or thin. And that is not the way we have received the gospel. The Methodist way, at its best, begins somewhere different. Grace goes first.

That is not a slogan for us. That is the ground under our feet. It means we believe God is already moving toward people before they know how to move toward God. It means belonging is not the reward for getting your life together. It means Jesus Christ reveals the heart of God not as condemnation, but as mercy that tells the truth and stays near. It means the font and the table are not religious extras, but the places where we remember who we are. It means holiness is not private superiority, but love made visible. It means when the way forward is unclear, we trust the Spirit enough to stay in the room and listen together.

That way of life matters right now. It matters because people are tired, and fear is loud. It matters because cruelty has become casual, and the world is constantly teaching us how to sort, dismiss, harden, and move on. It matters because too many people think Christianity is mostly about drawing sharper lines and protecting smaller circles.

We need another way. Or maybe better said, we need to remember the way we have been given. That is why we are doing *Our Way*.

I am inviting you to join a group or read the book, because this series is a chance to name what has formed us, and what we believe can still form people now. It is for longtime Methodists who have lived inside this grace-first tradition without always having language for it. And it is for newer people who have found something here that feels different and want to know why. It is a chance to say, clearly and confidently, that this grace-first way is not vague, watered down, or somehow less Christian. It is deeply Christian. It is rooted in Jesus. It is shaped by the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. And it is a way of life worth claiming.

I want us to claim it. Not timidly. Not apologetically. Not like we are borrowing it.

I want us to claim it because the world needs communities where grace goes first. Communities where people can stop bracing. Communities where no one is disposable. Communities where love becomes real.

That is the work and the witness. That is *Our Way*.
